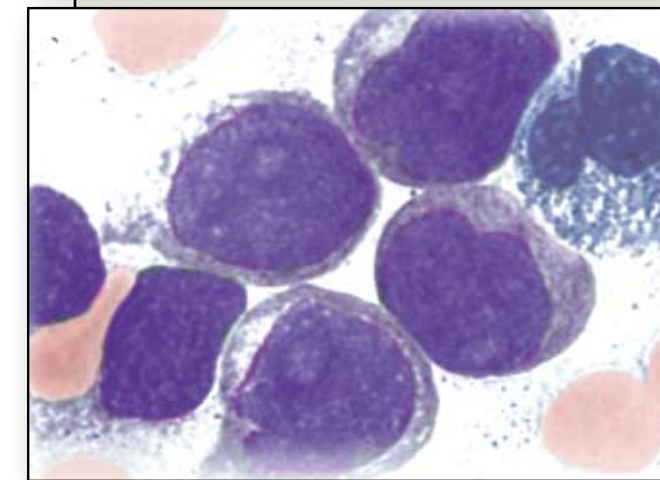

The *Duke Debates: Controversies in the Management of Patients With Hematologic Malignancies* symposium is intended to update physicians, advanced practice nurses, pharmacists, physician assistants, and other health care providers on advances in lymphoma, leukemia, multiple myeloma, myelodysplastic syndromes, and supportive care. Through didactic presentations, pro/con debates, and case studies, the audience will participate in discussions concerning the diagnosis and management of a variety of hematologic malignancies. In addition to the main session, small-group breakout sessions will address advanced practice nursing, pharmacy, and hematopathology.
